# Work for School Closure: April 20th - May 1st

## English:

Sound Book: The sounds and words are attached at the end of this document – to be stuck into their sound books.

- April 20<sup>th</sup> April 24<sup>th</sup>: Soft 'g' sounds like /j/ as in giraffe, orange etc.
- April  $27^{th}$  May  $1^{st}$ : alternative spelling of the sound 'ai' this is a revision of all the different ways the 'ai' sound can be spelled /ai/ as in rain, /a\_e/ as in game, and /ay/ as in day.

#### Tricky words:

Continuous revision — there are some lovely sight words games you can play to keep practicing your tricky words. There are lots of ideas online of you search "sight word games" but here are a few nice ideas too:

- Colour by sight word there are some examples attached to this document. Alternatively, you can take any colouring sheet/colouring book page and write some tricky words in the different parts of the page and provide a colour key for the children.
- **Sight Word Stomp** write some words using chalk on the ground outside alternatively you can write words on large pieces of paper and spread them on the floor outside or indoors. Parent/guardian calls out a word and the child/children stomp on the word.
- Go fish/Memory Game you can print flashcards 2 copies of each word (10-15 words is plenty) or alternatively just write the words on pieces of paper and turn them over on a table. Each player chooses two cards if they match they can keep the pair.
- Sight word fly swat using the same flashcards/written cards as above spread them out of the table. Parent/guardian calls out a word and the child/children try to 'swat' the word. You can use a wooden spoon/spatula etc if you don't have a fly swatter to hand!
- Sight word Bingo divide a page into 12 boxes each player writes one tricky word into each box. Parent/guardian calls out the words from a list whoever crossed out or covers up their words first is the winner.

## Phonics Pupil Book 3: Complete pages 10-15

### Note on Dictation - p.11 & 14

In school, we call out two sentences for the children to write into their books. These sentences contain the tricky words they have been practicing. There is no rush in completing this task and we keep calling out the sentence as many times as is needed. Also, you can call out the full sentence at first, but then repeat it one or two words at a time — whatever is easier for your child. You can also remind your child to use capital letters at the beginning of the sentence, spaces between their words and a full stop at the end.

## Dictation Sentences for page 11:

- 1. The other car was quicker.
- 2. There were a hundred sheep in the barn.

#### Dictation sentences for page 14:

- 1. We want more good books.
- 2. I need my coat because it is raining.

## Note on writing pages -12 & 15:

Children write about the topic (My Family & My House) with some guidance:

- Talk about the topic and make up sentences orally.
- Write some 'help words' on a piece of paper and guide the children as they write their sentences encouraging them to 'sound out' any words they are stuck on.
- Remember to leave spaces between words, use a capital letter at the beginning and a full stop at the end of a sentence.
- At this stage the children's spelling will not always be accurate, but their work will be readable. Spelling gradually improves through reading many books and learning the alternative letter-sound spellings (like in their sound books).
- Draw a picture in the picture frame.

<u>Reading:</u> Continue exposing your child to as much reading material as you can at this time whether it's books, comics, cereal boxes etc.
